EURO Working Groups & Networks Annual Report

The first EURO Working Group was created at the **EURO** Conference, first EURO I, in Brussels, in Since that several EURO Working Groups (EWGs) have been established. They have been established to give an organizational framework for smaller groups of researchers interested in a specific OR-topic. EWGs organize meetings and most of them publish a newsletter regularly. A common purpose for all the EWGs is to exchange ideas, experience, and results.

For forming a new EWG a group of

people interested in cooperation in a specific topic of OR is needed. In order to apply to become a EURO Working Group the group has to produce a short report containing preferably the objectives of the group and a tentative schedule of activity. Application forms can be obtained from the officers of EURO. The EURO Executive Committee decides on delivering the EURO label.

If the EURO label is delivered to a group it means that EURO has to be kept informed about the activities of the group. EURO includes the new EWG in the list of its official activities.

In forming a new EWG the following principles have to be met:

1. The EWGs should as far as possible bring together people with different professional backgrounds (industry, university, etc.).

2. They should be actually international; this requirement is met satisfactorily if at least 4, but possibly 5 or 6 nations are represented at each meeting and if the meetings do not take place too often in the same country.

3. Any group should be open to any

individual member of any EURO member society. Also persons that are not members of a national OR society can be accepted.

It is possible for a EWG to apply for financial help from EURO, Financial support can be granted e.g. for printing costs of common stationery, for administrative costs in the establishment of a new EWG and occasionally for meeting expenses, such as those of guest speakers, to some specific colloquium or seminar. On the other hand the EWGs have a duty to report yearly on their activities to the second EURO Vice-President. EWGs should also provide EURO with general information about some other (e.g. professional) body with which it plans a joint meeting.

To ease the work of EWGs EURO-k conferences can provide time and space for the meetings of the EWGs and the meetings can be set within the framework of the conference itself. Nowadays several EWGs have their meetings as side meetings of a EURO-k conference usually on the day(s) before the conference proper starts, or the day after it finishes. Other groups have their meetings between the EURO-k conferences.

If a group becomes inactive, it can be dissolved.

In more detail the matters of EURO working groups are stated in the charter of the EURO Working Groups.

PURPOSE AND HISTORY: Multicriteria decision aid is an important branch of Operational Research. Beyond the exchanges and meetings which already exist by means of the international conferences and the publications in the scientific journals, the objectives of the working group are the following:

-to contribute to develop an original way of thinking, at a European level in the field of multicriteria aid for decisions;

-to allow each member of the group to present his research, submit those to the critical discussion of the group, to present open problems;

-to keep a continuity in the exchanges and the work from one meeting to another;

-to keep the climate of a working group and not to transform the meeting in a small congress.

The working group was created at EURO I (Brussels, 1975). Since that time, two meetings are held each year, in Spring and Autumn. The 38 meetings have been organized by 14 different countries and they led to make participate to the life of the

group 679 different people.

NUMBER OF MEMBERS: 250. In 1975, the group consisted of 29 members divided into 5 different countries. Among the present members, 42 were already members in 1980. At this period, 23 countries were represented. During these last years, each meeting includes 5 to 20 new members (with an average of 13). These figures show how the group is alive, to the biological sense of the term.

PURPOSE AND HISTORY: This working group was formed at the EURO I Congress in Brussels in 1975. The initiator and first chairman of the group was Prof. H. Zimmermann of RTWH, Aachen, Germany. Prof. Carlsson was elected as the first president of the European Chapter, with Prof. M. Roubens the president-elect, Prof. P. Smets treasurer, Prof. U. Hohle secretary and Dr. D. Dubois and A. Straszak members at large. Prof. Roubens served as the president from 1986 until 1993.

The purpose of the IFSA-EC is to communicate and to promote knowledge of the theory of Fuzzy Sets and related areas and their applications.

In order to realize the objectives the IFSA-EC publishes Newsletters and Bulletins, organizes workshops and symposia, establishes sub-chapters and sponsors such other activities consistent with the objectives as may be directed by the Board.

PURPOSE AND HISTORY: The decision to set up the Health Working Group was taken at EURO I, Brussels, January 1975, making this group one of the first WGs established by EURO. The first meeting of the group took place in September 1975 in Exeter, UK and meetings have been taking place in different European countries every summer since then.

The aims of the group were restated at our 1991 meeting to be:

1.To improve co-operation and communication, and to encourage and support inspiration by group members.

2.To enable and support inter-disciplinary work on European health care issues.

3.To examine European health care systems using rational and systematic methods.

4.To encourage bilateral contacts between members throughout each year.

The title of the group "Operational Research Applied to Health Services" reflects the premise that the major challenge for OR scientists currently working in the health field lies not in developing new and/or more sophisticated techniques, but in using what expertise they currently possess to make more of an impact on the delivery of healthcare.

The idea is to provide a professional network, where the emphasis is on the exchange of professional knowledge by establishing social relations. To achieve this end, the size of the group is kept relatively small, continuity of the group is regarded as highly valuable and the social programme of the meetings plays an important part.

NUMBER OF MEMBERS: 104 on the register from 21 countries, 61 members have a continuing involvement and attend the annual meetings.

PURPOSE AND HISTORY: At the end of the Second EURO Summer Institute (Brussels, July 1985), which was devoted to Multicriteria Analysis, the participants expressed a strong interest in continuing to work together. This was the result of three weeks of fruitful and friendly collaboration. So, the idea was born to create a working group on Multicriteria Analysis.

ESIGMA is open to everybody who is interested in Multicriteria Analysis and who wants to present results, applications or open problems, and to participate in the discussions, or simply to learn about this subject and to be kept well informed of its recent developments. One very important aspect is that the meetings of ESIGMA should not be too formal: a large place should be given to discussions. This means that problems which are not completely solved are welcome.

As another group already exists within the EURO on the same subject (Multicriteria Aid for Decisions), it must be pointed out that the purpose of ESIGMA obviously is not to be in competition with it but to be complementary to it in two ways essentially:

a)in order to make it easier for the researchers to attend the meetings of the group, ESIGMA will meet once a year, at the occasion of the EURO Conferences; special arrangements will be made for years without a EURO Conference. b)in order to encourage people of all nationalities to participate, the main language of ESIGMA will be English (an understanding of French is recommended for participation in the meetings of the other group).

PURPOSE AND HISTORY: The EURO Working Group on Financial Modelling was founded in September 1986 in Lisbon. The primary field of interest for the working group can be described as "financial models that help to solve problems faced by financial managers in the firm". From this the following objectives of the working group are distinguished:

-providing an international forum for exchange of information and experience on financial modelling; -encouraging research in financial modelling (new techniques, methodologies, empirical studies, software, etc.); -stimulating and strengthening the interaction between financial eco-

nomic theory and the practice of financial decision making; -cooperating and exchanging information with other universities and financial institutions throughout Eu-

rope.

The meetings of the Working Group are organized twice a year, in April and in November. Earlier meetings were held in Belgium, Curação, Cyprus, Finland, Italy, The Netherlands, United Kingdom and Germany. The meetings are attended by 80-100 members on average, most of them scientists but also representatives from the financial institutions, and are usually organized on Thursday, Friday and Saturday morning. The organizers are expected to schedule three types of sessions: a round table session with invited speaker(s), reqular sessions with the presentation of refereed papers and balloon sessions in which unrefereed papers, new topics and "loose" ideas can be discussed.

NEWSLETTER: The newsletter of the

working group, called NEWSFLOW, is published twice a year, one month before each meeting. A decision was made to create the EURO Working Group on Decision Support Systems as a forum for continued exchange and collaboration among the Ps and the Ls (i.e. the Participants and the Lecturers of that institute) and interested new members.

Since that time, the group has come quite a long way. Its members have been very active conducting individual/joint research work as well as giving the group increasing visibility. Several activities have already taken place; many others are in the planning stage. The group has been meeting once a year, every time in a different country.

PURPOSE AND HISTORY: In the world of Operational Research, the gap between theory and practice is well-known. Here "theory" stands for a plethora of activities mainly taking place at universities; they are aimed at, e.g., developing new concepts and creating better algorithms, in other words: at the mathematics of OR. Application of the marvellous findings of our science in real life situations, e.g. in industry, commerce and agriculture, is what we mean by "practice".

Many OR workers have tried to bridge this gap, convinced that it is undesirable, for society as well as for our profession. This has resulted in articles in professional journals, books and courses especially designed to support managers. But the gap continues to exist, albeit less wide than in the past.

At a very modest scale, we have tried since May 1986 to promote our profession outside academic circles. At the IFORS'90 Conference in Athens, we presented our ideas and achievements so far, and had the pleasure of meeting persons interested in joining an OR netwORk. Later on, we received very encouraging mail from all over the world. At EURO XI at Aachen, in 1991, we continued our efforts with the result that more people joined the network. Formal contacts with IFORS and EURO have been established also.

During the IFORS'93 Conference, on Friday 16 July 1993, another meeting of the OR netwORk was held in

which some 15 persons took part. OR Insight got there 1st

A comment by S. Ward (OR Newsletter April 1994)

It would seem that Professor Spronk does not read our own OR Insight! I guess that most readers would not classify Insight as one of Professor Spronk's "scientific journals": certainly Insight aims to provide material that is easily accessible and of practical relevance. Indeed. Professor Spronk might find it useful to read the "Information for Contributors" that appears inside the back cover of every issue of OR Insight, and the first paragraph in particular:

Whatever the case study, authors will be encouraged not merely to describe an intervention for its own sake, but to show how an approach was useful, or why it wasn't. Authors should also attempt to draw general lessons for use in other situations. In the case of long and complex interventions, authors will be advised to write articles which focus on one particular problem issue in the intervention.

The main criteria for publication of contributors are relevance and interest to man-

agers and management science practitioners, and readability. In practice, I suspect Insight is also of relevance and interest to an increasing number of students of OR. Moreover, I hope we already provide practitioners with the opportunity to ventilate insights obtained through applying MS/OR techniques and studying decision problems in practice, without the rigorous requirements for technical sophistication and novelty asso-"scientific ciated with the journals". Hopefully, too, OR Insight is stimulating reading even if we may fall short of providing "mind teasing" material!

Naturally I hope ORS members will continue to favour OR Insight with their contributions. But perhaps there will be scope for an interchange of material between OR Insight and the EURO Bulletin in the light of Professor Spronk's initiative. There is certainly scope for wider dissemination of existing literature!
